

Checklist Use

- Errors of omission are some of the most common everyday forms of error, even among highly skilled experts, and have occurred in about 20% of flight crew-involved major accidents
- For optimum benefit, normal checklist items should be verbally called out by flight crewmembers using a challengeverification-response format
- Executing checklists by memory or without standardized verbal callouts removes many of their benefits and leaves a flight crew more susceptible to error.







N28U Accident on July 24, 2021

- On July 24, 2021, an SIAI Marchetti SM.1019B, registration N28U, was destroyed at KLWS, Lewiston, Idaho
- The pilot, Navy aviator Dale "Snort" Snodgrass, was fatally injured.
- The Marchetti was owned by 717 Aviation Inc, and was being operated as a Part 91 flight.
- The <u>NTSB report</u>, released on July 6, concluded that <u>Snodgrass</u> failed to remove his plane's flight control lock
- "Had the pilot completed a functional check of the controls before initiating takeoff, the presence of the lock would have been detected and the accident would have been prevented."

Aero Club Checklists


- There's a reason USAF Aero Clubs require use of checklists
- Several expected to be completed prior to and during flight
 - Preflight aids
 - Aircraft In-flight Operations
- Some you should already have memorized
 - Power Loss in Flight
 - Emergency Engine Restart
 - Engine Fire in Flight
 - Landing Checklist








Final Thoughts

- Use your checklists!
 - Even great pilots sadly have died because they failed to do so
 - The steps in them are all important, don't skip them unless consciously appropriate
 - » INOP system
 - » no Autopilot on the Warrior
- Follow both the ground and in-flight checklists
- Memorize the critical ones you won't have time to look-up when seconds count
 - Power Loss in Flight
 - Emergency Engine Restart
 - Engine Fire in Flight
 - Landing Checklist
- Don't just say them in your head, verbalize the steps
 - Don't just say it, do it after you say it and confirm
 - "Gear down, 3-green, no Red, check"
